# Mayor Mayer and Council honor young heroes

During the Township's Council Meeting on Jan. 23rd the Mayor and Council recognized two brave teenagers that saved a man's life. In November 2016 Mo Hubballa and Jack Bisani were driving past Chews Elementary School when "I saw something out of the corner of my eye and I told my friend to pull over. He kind of saw it too. Then he pulled over and it was a body, " Huballa said. "We went up to him and he was unconscious so we called 911 right away and they came within two minutes," Jack Bisani recalled. "They saved my life," Derek Blakelock couldn't be more grateful for the heroic actions of these two young men.

"These two young men went beyond the call of duty. Today we want to bring them up; we want to acknowledge them as role models to their peers, as role models to the citizens of Gloucester Township," noted Mayor David Mayer.

## HELP SOMEONE WHO IS UNCONSCIOUS:

Call or tell someone to call 911
Check the person's airway, breathing and pulse frequently
If necessary, begin CPR
If the person is breathing and lying on their back, and you do not think there is a spinal injury, carefully roll the person toward you onto their side
Wait for help to arrive

## **Road Update**


The potholes are now being repaired throughout the Township. Below are the images of "before and after" the repair on Blenheim-Erial Rd. in the Blackwood Section of Gloucester Township.



As winter weather conditions are taking affect on the East Coast so are the potholes. Gloucester Township's Public Works have officially started the fight against potholes with 3 trucks circulating around neighborhoods. Two of the trucks have tow-behind carts that hold 3 tons of asphalt each. The other truck is an actual pothole truck that holds stone and emulsion which, when combined, hardens to form to the pothole. Each truck is manned by 2 employees.
