Highland High School Students Address Global Water Crisis

Highland High School hosted their 3rd Annual Walk for Water on Wednesday, May 30th.

They filled hundreds of gallon jugs with water in order to demonstrate what its like to walk in the shoes of women in Swaziland, Africa who must walk up to eight miles in order to retrieve fresh drinking water. The task of collecting water tends to fall on women and children ages 8-13. Because they spend so many hours hauling water, women are unable to get jobs and children are often unable to get an education.

All proceeds from this event will go to the Thirst Project, an organization dedicated to putting an end to the global water crisis. Like many countries throughout the world, Africa has limited access to fresh water. The money raised at this event will go to fund the construction of a water well in Swaziland. These types of wells usually cost \$12,000.

We would like to thank Highland for partnering with Hershey High School to bring a fresh water well to the people of Swaziland.

GTPD INFORMS RESIDENTS ABOUT THE POTENTIAL MISUSE OF ELECTRONIC CIGARETTES

On Thursday, May 31st, the Gloucester Township Police Department held a press conference to announce a significant drug arrest and to inform the community of the potential misuse of electronic cigarettes.

On Monday, May 21st, Officer Doug Wallace conducted a motor vehicle stop on a Nissan Sentra. During the course of the investigation, a total of 3,000 cartridges, each containing what is believed approximately .5 grams of THC oil, were located inside the vehicle. A total of three suspects were arrested.

"My gut tells me that if not stopped, some of these cartridges would havefound their way into the hands of minors and this is a great concern. We now have a new device that can not only contain marijuana but can also contain more dangerous drugs such as heroin. We are trying to get the word out that these devices can be knowingly or unknowingly used by children of our community. We are the first town in the state of New Jersey with a drug counselor in our municipal court and we are proud of the programs we have adopted here to address this national epidemic. Today, we are helping educate the public and make sure that they understand that these devices can be used in harmful ways," said Mayor Mayer. "Our purpose today goes well beyond this arrest. We'd like to remind residents that if they have questions about our SAVE advocate, to contact us at 856-302-7051. We'd like to encourage parents to speak with their children about the dangerous of addiction and drugs," said Chief Harry Earle
