PUBLIC WORKS HARD AT WORK PREPARING THE TOWNSHIP FOR SPRING

Public works has been out and about preparing the township for the warmer months ahead. As the baseball and softball seasons approach, they've installed two new score-boards and have been prepping the fields for opening days.

One of these scoreboards is located at the girls' softball field, Glover Field, off of Evesham Road; with the other located at the June Drive Baseball Field--both up and running for the upcoming season.

They've also been working on building a new facility at the Gloucester Township Police Department's gun range, located at 800 Hickstown Road. The gun range is where police officers go to practice and pass mandatory qualification every six months. It also has an obstacle course designed for K9 training.

The Gloucester Township Police Department has been due for a new gun range facility for quite some time as their current trailers dating back to the 50s are deteriorating. The newly-constructed 80 x 50-foot pole barn will house offices, classrooms, and will be used to store equipment.


FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE CRAZY ABOUT BOOKS!

The Book Asylum, a family owned and operated bookstore in the downtown Blackwood section, has been providing Gloucester Township residents with books for the last eight years. The owners, Rosemary and Jeff, were avid readers that ran out of room to store all of their books so Jeff took his wife for a walk one day and showed her a little store front on the Black Horse Pike; and The Book Asylum was born!

The Book Asylum offers an eclectic selection of both new and used books. They even offer store credit if you bring in your own gently used books.

The bookstore doubles as a small cafe--a place to sit down, read your favorite book and enjoy a cup of coffee or tea with complimentary wifi. They also host a Writer's Group hosted by a local author on the first Thursday of each month. "The people that you meet are the best part of my job," says Rosemary. "Finding people that read what you read; that is why I do what I do."
