Gloucester Township's Response to COVID-19

During our nation's current health crisis, Gloucester Township has had to reinvent the way that essential government operations continued while implementing all the necessary measures to "flatten the curve" in our community. Mayor David Mayer and Chief David Harkins held an emergency meeting with Camden County Health Department Officials and the Gloucester Township Emergency Management Team in early March when COVID-19 concerns first emerged in the United States. Following that meeting, the Gloucester Township Police Department began discussing pandemic operation procedures and PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) acquisition to ensure that they would be in the best possible position to operate under pandemic conditions.

In order to protect both the public and municipal employees as well as to curb the spread of COVID-19, the decision was made to close the municipal building starting the week of March 16th. The building remained closed throughout the first two months of the pandemic. Only those employees deemed essential reported to work to sustain critical resources such as emergency services, public safety, and waste collection. Municipal employees deemed non-essential worked remotely during these months to serve Gloucester Township's residents to the best of their ability during these unique times. Mayor Mayer began holding daily conference calls with Chief Harkins, Township Council, Gloucester Township department directors, and other leadership to coordinate the most efficient response to this national emergency.

"I express my gratitude to all of the first responders and frontline workers: our Emergency Management Team, AMR EMS, our six fire departments, and all of the medical workers who have worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic. I'd like to thank our Gloucester Township Police Department who put their health and safety on the line every day and adjusted their operations tremendously to ensure the safety of our community during this crisis," says Mayor David Mayer. "I would also like to thank our Public Works Department who performed essential services in our community including road maintenance, waste removal, and the cleaning and sanitizing of our township properties; and all of our municipal employees who were working remotely, returning residents' phone calls and monitoring emails. Last but not least, I commend our school districts for facilitating such a smooth transition into remote learning for all of our students."

Upon the shutdown of schools here in Gloucester Township, the administration, teachers, and staff at Gloucester Township Public Schools and Black Horse Pike Regional School District worked hard to make sure that every student in Gloucester Township had the proper resources that they needed in order to get the most out of the new remote learning experience. The school districts' food service departments continued to distribute free daily meals to the students in need.

In the beginning of the health crisis the residents that appeared to face the biggest threat were our senior citizens and vulnerable populations. When schools closed down, Gloucester Township Police School Resource Officers and Community Relations Officers were deployed to these community members to provide their undivided support and assistance. Gloucester Township Senior and Community Services staff also worked day in and day out to ensure that the seniors in our community got everything they needed when they needed it.

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused events around the world to be postponed and canceled altogether as it poses a threat to the health and wellbeing of the general public. This was no different in Gloucester Township where officials were forced to cancel several major events including Gloucester Township Day, National Night Out, and Gloucester Township's 325th Anniversary Celebration in everyone's best interest.

Although the community of Gloucester Township has managed to "flattened the curve" here in Gloucester Township, the virus is not yet past our nation and residents are strongly encouraged to adhere to the CDC's (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) guideline of wearing masks in public, keeping a distance of six feet, and limiting social gatherings. As of September 1, 2020, there have been a total of 976 positive COVID-19 tests and 58 fatalities as a result of COVID-19 since the start of the pandemic in March. A total of 10 Gloucester Township Police Officers tested positive for COVID-19 from performing their duties; however, all ten have recovered and returned to duty.

"The men and women of the Gloucester Township Police Department have been working in an unprecedented way to respond to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Gloucester Township Emergency Management Team, led by Mayor David Mayer, has been coordinating with our national, state, county, surrounding government and community partners. We remain 100% capable of responding to and handling emergencies as we have throughout the pandemic," says Chief David Harkins. "I couldn't be prouder of the men and women of the Gloucester Township Police Department who have stepped up to every challenge that we have encountered. Thank you to all who have expressed support to us and for all of the cooperation provided to us during the pandemic."

The municipal building is still closed to the public; however, employees are present Monday-Thursday, 8:00 am – 5:45 pm to answer your calls, respond to emails, check the mail, and process documents such as permits, which can be left in the drop-box out front of the main entrance. Gloucester Township Community Garden

Are you interested in getting more involved with gardening? Joining your local community garden is a great option, but if you own or rent your home, there are many things you can plant that will benefit both you and Mother Nature. Many native plant areas have disappeared with the building of more subdivisions. Also, many homeowners tend to select plants that look good without much maintenance. However, individu-



als can create their own pockets of sustainable native horticulture in small patches within their yards or in containers.

At the Gloucester Township Community Garden, we are not only growing vegetables and herbs, but we are growing annual and perennial flowers that provide nectar, pollen, and food sources for bees, butterflies, hummingbirds, and birds. Native perennials such as garden phlox, black-eyed Susans, zinnias, and many other flowering plants are perfect for these little critters.

We have added native milkweed to the flower beds in the community garden which provides the plant on which the monarch butterfly lays her eggs for the larvae to eat when the eggs hatch. The number of monarchs we have observed are increasing every year. We have also had many swallowtail butterflies this year, of different varieties. These butterflies lay their eggs on parsley, carrot tops, etc., which are the host plants for the larvae. There are many smaller butterflies that live in our garden as well. The caterpillars from these provide much food for the birds that live in the area around the Gabreil Daveis Tavern.

We would love to have you stop in to see what we are doing at the community garden. If you live in an apartment or townhouse and don't have space to grow anything, check to see if we have plots to rent early in March of 2021. The date for new renters to sign up will be advertised in the next Newsletter.

CHAPTER 47 ~ PETS

Dogs and cats are strictly prohibited from: running loose (at large), defecating on any portion of public or private property (owners must dispose of feces in a suitable and sanitary manner) and habitual/excessive barking.

What is the 2020 Census?

The 2020 Census counts every person living in the United States as well as the five US territories. The 2020 Census will mark the 24th time that the country has counted



its population since 1790. The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the US Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. You should have received an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire in the mail back in March. You have the option to respond to the questionnaire online (https://2020census.gov), by phone (844-330-2020), or by mail.

Why They Conduct the Census

The census provides critical data that is used to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to schools, fire departments, roads, senior services, job training and many other resources based on census data. The 2020 Census will determine how this funding flows to communities just like ours.

You Count, I Count, We all Count!

Participating in the census is required by law, even if you recently completed another survey from the Census Bureau. A complete and accurate count is critical for our community because the result of the 2020 Census will affect community funding, congressional representation, and much more.

During the 2020 Census, the Census Bureau will never ask:

- Your Social Security number
- Money or donations
- Anything on behalf of a political party
- Your bank or credit card account numbers

Additionally, there is no citizenship question on the 2020 Census. If someone claiming to be from the Census Bureau contacts you via email or phone and asks you for one of these things, it's a scam, and you should not cooperate.

What Happens to Your Answers?

It is important to know that your personal information collected during the census is kept confidential. The Census Bureau is bound by federal law to protect your information, and your data is used only for statistical purposes.

PET WASTE AND WATER POLLUTION

Pet waste is carried by rain, melting snow, and ice to storm drains that empty into rivers, lakes, and the ocean. It also reaches reservoirs which supply much of the drinking water in New Jersey. Pollution due to pet waste negatively impacts swim-ming, boating and fishing in these water bodies. Pet waste contains microorganisms that can cause bacterial diseases, roundworms and parasitic infections. In addition, pet waste contains harmful levels of nutrients which promote excessive algae and plant growth. This can rob the waterbody of oxygen, potentially killing all aquatic life in the area. Such nutrient pollution also causes waters to become cloudy and green.

Proper Pet Waste Disposal

Flush it down the toilet. *Do not flush bags, debris, or nonbiodegradable items* or place it in the trash.

Gloucester Township Police Department ReEntry Program

As part of our community policing initiatives, the Gloucester Township Police Department has a reentry program for recent parolees who are being released from a term of incarceration. The goal of the program is to provide support to parolees to improve their chances of a crime free reentry into the community. When we are notified of a parolee being released, we contact the person and provide them with resources which will help them gain employment, recover from addiction, and even help them earn their high school diploma if they never completed school. We work closely with the New Jersey State Parole Board to identify parolees who are Gloucester Township residents, and they receive a letter from the Chief of Police welcoming them back to our community. The Reentry Program provides recent parolees with free resources to help them succeed and reenter as productive members of the community.

Get Important Alerts.

An informed and engaged community is a strong community. Increased information sharing with residents improves public safety and community relations. The GTPD encourages you to receive important community information. You can receive safety tips, media releases, and police community relations events via email. The GTPD Community Notification System provides greater capabilities to notify our community. Importantly, in this age of instant communication, the GTPD along with the township's Office of Emergency Management must be able to effectively reach residents with road closures, safety warnings or community safety bulletins. Our Community Notification System will give the GTPD the ability to notify thousands of residents, staff members, and volunteers within minutes by sending out text messages and emails instantly. Autism/Development Disability Registration

The Gloucester Township Police Department has created a registry for individuals with Autism or disabilities in efforts to give police quick access in an emergency to critical information about a

person who is registered. The registry can provide police with emergency contact information, detailed physical descriptions, known routines, favorite attractions or special needs of an individual with Autism Disorder or other disabilities such as: Alzheimer's, Dementia, Down Syndrome or any other endangered individuals. This information can greatly assist police officers when time is essential in communicating and dealing with an emergency situation involving a person with Autism Disorder as well as other disabilities. The information you provide is confidential and will only be used by law enforcement.

GT Emergency Needs Preparedness Registry

The Gloucester Township Police Department (GTPD) has created a voluntary Gloucester Township Emergency Needs Preparedness Registry that will let police, fire and other first responders in our community better prepare for, and respond to your needs during a hurricane, storm or other major emergency. This has been established to collect information for emergency responders to help assist those with special needs or high risks during an emergency, especially when family, caregivers or others are unable to help them.

Many people may need extra help during a time of emergency including people who:

- Use life support systems such as oxygen, respirator, ventilator, dialysis, pacemaker, or are insulin dependent;
- · Have mobility disabilities and use a wheelchair, scooter, walker, cane, or other mobility device;
- Are visually impaired, blind, hard of hearing, or deaf;
- · Have speech, cognitive, developmental or mental health disabilities; or
- Use assistive animals or a prosthesis.

Your information is held confidentially and will only be accessed to assist in your safety and well-being in the time of an emergency affecting your area of Gloucester Township. This notification allows first responders additional time to consider how to best respond to that incident. Please note that strict confidentiality is maintained at all times and only those that have a reason to access the information are authorized to do so.

If you cannot complete the enrollment form yourself, a family member, caregiver, or authorized representative can enroll on your behalf. Cpl. Messick has been with the Gloucester Twp. Police Department since 2005. Before then, he was a Camden County Corrections Officer and is a Veteran of the United States Air Force Reserves, serving from 2000-2006 in the 514th Security Forces Squadron. He proudly served our Country overseas after 9/11 in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Ptl. Randy Pearce can usually be seen in one of our schools mentoring our youth as one of Gloucester Twp. Police's LEAD Instructors. LEAD stands for Law Enforcement Against Drugs and is an important program to help our chil-



dren make the right decisions when confronted with any type of drugs or alcohol. He spends most of the school year teaching the students the dangers of narcotics; that is until this past spring. Ptl. Randy Pearce, a hometown resident and graduate of Timbercreek High School, has been serving his Country in the New Jersey National Guard in a Military police Unit. In 2011, he was deployed to Afghanistan and now has been deployed to the Naval Station Guantanamo Bay in Cuba since March.

Ptl. Pearce was hired by Gloucester Twp. Police Department in July 2014 and has always worked hard to serve his community the best he can. Ptl. Pearce is one officer who clearly lives by our motto of "Dedicated to Service, Committed to Excellence". The Gloucester Township Police Department is proud of Ptl. Driving Safety Tips During the Return of School

The start of school is always a busy and stressful time of the year. The Gloucester Township Police recommends the following back to school safety tips for drivers. By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.

If You're Dropping Off

Schools often have very specific drop-off procedures for the school year. Make sure you know them for the safety of all kids. The following apply to all school zones:

- Don't double park; it blocks visibility for other children and vehicles
- Don't load or unload children across the street from the school

Sharing the Road with Young Pedestrians

According to research by the National Safety Council, most of the children who lose their lives in bus-related incidents are 4 to 7 years old, and they're walking. They are hit by the bus, or by a motorist illegally passing a stopped bus. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe:

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of moving traffic
- · In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- · Always stop for a school resource officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
- Don't honk or rev your engine to scare a pedestrian, even if you have the right of way
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Always use extreme caution to avoid striking pedestrians wherever they may be, no matter who has the right of way


Sharing the Road with School Buses

If you're driving behind a bus, allow a greater following distance than if you were driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing. It is illegal in all 50 states to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.

- Never pass a bus from behind or from either direction if you're on an undivided road if it is stopped to load or unload children
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus
- Be alert; children often are unpredictable, and they tend to ignore hazards and take risks
- By exercising a little extra care and caution, drivers and pedestrians can co-exist safely in school zones.

BRUSH PICKUP

As per Township Ordinance, branches, hedge trimmings, light brush clippings, etc. must be securely tied into **four foot (4') bundles** that can be easily handled and the diameter of any branch may not exceed six inches (6"). The bundles shall not exceed **fifty (50) pounds** in weight. Public Works will pick up bundles on your designated day only if the ordinance is followed.

During storm damage, we will work with residents to pick up their brush, however the ordinance must be followed. No commercial vehicles can dump at Public Works. For questions on brush pickup please call Public Works at 856-228-3144.

The GTMUA will pick up your grass in bags until Oct. 31, 2020. Please separate your grass from yard debris, sticks, trash, etc or it will not be picked up by the GTMUA. To contact the GTMUA, please call 856-227-8666.



Help us Recycle:

Public Works accepts car batteries, used oil, eye glasses, ink cartridges, metals and concrete. All items must be delivered to the Public Works building during office hours.

White Goods Pick-Up

Saturday Drop-Off Hours at Public Works

The Public Works facility will be open on Saturdays, September 5th through November 21st, from 8am-2pm for residential recycling drop off. This will be for brush, oil, white goods, electronics, metals, concrete, propane tanks, and car batteries. We do not accept paint or trash.

Bagged Grass Clippings

GTPW collects leaves according to the fall leaf schedule. A second pick up will start after the first round is complete, weather permitting. Residents are reminded to rake their leaves curbside, NOT IN THE STREET, only during the fall leaf schedule which ends 12/31. After this time all leaves must be bagged.

REMINDER

It is helpful if residents, especially after a storm, would help keep the grates at storm drains clear or notify Public Works when they become clogged.

As a result, we have made a decision not to offer the preschool program in the fall. While this decision has not been an easy one and not one made lightly, we are hopeful that in the coming months, restrictions will be relaxed and we can resume our preschool programming for the winter session.
