Gloucester Township Police Department Receives "Destination Zero" National Award

In October, the Gloucester Township Police Department conducted a press conference on receiving the Destination Zero 2023 Comprehensive Safety Award from the National Law Enforcement Officer Memorial Fund Museum in Washington, DC. This national award recognizes a law enforcement agency that has successfully developed, implemented and promoted the most comprehensive officer wellness programs and strategically implemented them. Relating to officer wellness, the GTPD enhanced its agency training program by installing a VirTra Simulator to further improve officers' critical decision-making skills with use of force training and mastering of real-time tactics and strategies.

The VirTra Simulator is a virtual reality training system designed to help officers improve how they respond to active shooter, domestic violence, and other high-stress situations. The purchase of this advanced critical decision-making equipment was made possible after the GTPD was awarded competitive federal funding through the Department of Justice (DOJ) Community Oriented Policing Services FY22 Law Enforcement Agency De-Escalation grant. "As part of our goal to be the very best police department we can be, the men and women of the Gloucester Township Police Department have worked together to make safety and wellness a top priority. We recognize that our greatest asset is the people who put their lives on the line, to serve Gloucester Township. We know that officers who are trained, well equipped, and who are provided with wellness skills are more confident. Officers who are confident and well trained, perform better and are more effective in maintaining safety, order and harmony in our great community," said Chief David Harkins.

The VirTra V-180® Simulator offers a 180-degree immersive training environment of three large screens to teach law enforcement officers how to be aware of their entire surroundings and develop real-world survival skills. The system offers hundreds of fully interactive scenarios to include judgmental use of force, de-escalation, non- escalation, skill drills to improve tactics, confidence and vital communication skills when assessing a subject's verbal and non-verbal threat cues to teach, train and test officers to better protect our communities safely. Each training scenario is conducted in a safe, controlled environment, where learning is the focus. These scenarios help officers improve their critical thinking skills and weapons skills under pressure



and psychological stresses of life-like situations. After each session, the trainer reviews the officer's response and debriefs on what they felt, saw and heard, and why and how they responded the way they did. The process allows them to refine their skills, decision making and improve their communication skills.

"Receiving this award is no small feat. It has taken years of training and implementing new programs aimed at officers' safety and wellness; and I want to thank Chief and everyone who was part of the process of certifying what we are doing here in Gloucester Township. We went up against departments throughout this nation, and we came out Number One. That's a great tribute to the officers themselves to have this comprehensive safety award; so, congratulations to the entire department. The state-of-the-art simulator will help further protect the residents of our town and our officers. Safety is a priority here in Gloucester Township. Our Council and I are dedicated to the responsibility of making sure that our officers have the resources that they need to be safe and to continue to keep our residents safe," said Mayor Mayer.

GTPD Adds 2 Hybrid Vehicles to Fleet



Gloucester Township Mayor Mayer and Chief David Harkins announced that 2 Hybrid Police Interceptors had been acquired for the Gloucester Township Police Department. Commonly, police vehicles spend, on average, 60% to 70% of their time stopped and idling (vehicles must be kept turned on to operate the systems properly).

With the all-new 2022 Police Interceptor Utility Hybrids, the gasoline engine is off for about 80% of the time that the vehicle is idle, and all the equipment that needs to be kept on and functioning can be powered by the lithium-ion hybrid battery (battery charge is kept in the equipment).

30% to 70% range to power all the needed equipment).

The new Hybrid has a projected EPA-estimated rating of 24 mpg combined, a 41 percent improvement over the outgoing Police Interceptor Utility equipped with a 3.7-liter gas engine. Another advantage is reduced brake wear due to the regenerative braking system. Brake life can now be extended by three times! Additionally, there is less overall engine maintenance, greater horsepower, torque and top speed.

Gloucester Township Ecological Center: Saving The Environment & Taxpayers Money! Did you know that Gloucester

Township has an Ecological Center? The Ecological Center composts leaves and grass and produces organic compost for sale.

When residents rake leaves to the curb, they are delivered to the Ecological Center and formed into windrows. The leaves sit dormant until spring grass collection when grass clippings are mixed with the leaves. The backhus turner aerates the windrows every two weeks; and when they stop generating heat, the mixture starts the curing process where it further breaks down. The compost is then sold to nurseries and landscapers. The process takes about a year and a half from the incoming of leaves to selling of the compost. This saves the taxpayers more money because the leaves and grass clippings would have otherwise gone to the landfill, which is more expensive. The Gloucester Township Ecological Center serves the entire Camden County. This is a shared services that involves 23 towns.

Camden County Special Needs Registry

The Gloucester Township Police Department and the Camden County Prosecutors Office have a registry for individuals with Special Needs and disabilities in an effort to give police quick access in an emergency to critical information about a person who is registered. The registry can provide police with emergency contact information, detailed physical descriptions, known routines, favorite attractions, or the needs of an individual with Special Needs and other disabilities such as Alzheimer's, Dementia, Down Syndrome, or any other endangered individuals.

This information can greatly assist police officers when time is essential in communicating and dealing with an emergency situation involving a person with Special Needs and disabilities. The online registration asks for valuable information that the police officer may need when helping individuals with Special Needs and disabilities. We ask that all questions be filled out completely and a current photograph be provided, which can be submitted online to Camden County Prosecutors Office Special Needs Registry here: https://camdencountypros.org/community-page/41

The information you provide is confidential and will only be used by our police officers. If any of the information on the registration changes you are encouraged to re-register as soon as possible.

Another step we have taken to better assist our Gloucester Township community members with Autism and Special Needs is by creating a sticker that can be placed on your vehicle or near the main entrance to your home that will alert an approaching officer that someone in the vehicle or the home could have a special need. We also have seatbelt sleeves that will warn a First Responder during an incident such as a motor vehicle crash that the occupant has Autism and may not respond.

Would you like to learn more about the Gloucester Township Police Department? The Gloucester Township Police Department in a continuing effort to foster an even better police community partnership would like to invite any Gloucester Township resident 16 years of age or older to attend the Citizen's Police Academy.

The Gloucester Township Police Department Citizen's Police Academy is a free 14 week course that begins January each year. Application announcement will be made two months prior. The classes will be on Thursday evenings from 6:30 PM to approximately 8:30 PM. The course will include an overview of the police department and the administration, police communications, special operations, criminal investigations, traffic safety, K9, Special Response Team, Crime Scene Unit and much more. Also, all attendees of the Citizen Police Academy will be trained in the use of CPR for the home.

The objective of the Citizen's Police Academy is not to train an individual to be a Police Officer but to produce informed citizens. The Citizens and Police Officers meet each other face to face in a neutral, friendly setting and each becomes a person to the other. In the past, citizens have simply seen a uniform, now they have an understanding about the person behind the badge. Through your participation in the Citizen's Police Academy program, you are promoting community involvement, which in itself is the most powerful force any law enforcement agency has in the fight against crime.

This is also the first step as a community partner and those who may be interested in becoming a Gloucester Township Police Volunteer. Neighborhood Watch



Neighborhood Watch, Block Watch, Town Watch, Building Watch, Crime Watch – whatever the name, it's one of the most effective and least costly way to prevent crime and reduce fear. Neighborhood Watch fights the isolation that crime both creates and feeds upon. It forges bonds among area residents, helps reduces burglaries and robberies, and improves relations between

police and the communities they serve.

WHY NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH?

• It works. Throughout the country, dramatic decreases in burglary and related offenses are reported by law enforcement professionals in communities with active Watch programs.

• Today's transient society produces communities that are less personal. Many families have two working parents and children involved in many activities keeping them away from home. An empty house in a neighborhood where none of the neighbors know the owner is a prime target for burglary.

• Neighborhood Watch also helps build pride and serves as a springboard for efforts that address other community concerns such as recreation for youth, child care, and affordable housing.

HOW DOES A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH START?

A motivated individual, a few concerned residents, a community organization, or a law enforcement agency can spearhead the efforts to establish a Watch. Together they can:

• Organize a small planning committee of neighbors to discuss needs, the level of interest, and possible community problems.

• Contact the local police or sheriff's department, or local crime prevention organization, for help in training members in home security and reporting skills and for information on local crime patterns.

• Hold an initial meeting to gauge neighbors' interest; establish the purpose of the program; and begin to identify issues that need to be addressed.

Select a coordinator.

• Ask for block captain volunteers who are responsible for relaying information to members.

• Recruit members, keeping up-to-date information on new residents and making special efforts to involve the elderly, working parents, and young people.

• Work with local government or law enforcement to put up Neighborhood Watch signs, usually after at least 50 percent of all households are enrolled.

WHAT DOES A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH DO?

A Neighborhood Watch is neighbors helping neighbors. They are extra eyes and ears for reporting crime and helping neighbors. Members meet their neighbors, learn how to make their homes more secure, watch out for each other and the neighborhood, and report activity that raises their suspicions to the police or sheriff's office.

The Gloucester Township Police Department is requesting Gloucester Township, New Jersey residents, businesses, and organizations that have security cameras in place on their property to complete a short registration form.

The registration DOES NOT give the Gloucester Township Police Department access to your camera system, and only allows our agency to maintain a data base reference of active cameras in the event a crime occurs in the area. For example if a burglary occurs down the street from your property, we would know your camera may have captured an image of a vehicle or suspect that could connect us to the suspects involved in the burglary. A detective would be able to contact you and ask to review the footage in hopes of identifying a suspect description or any information that can help the case.

Gloucester Township Police Safe Exchange Zone



The GTPD has a Safe Exchange Zone inside and outside our department. The inside location is located between the watch desk area and court room and the outside location is located by the front steps of the Police Department.

This Safe Exchange Zone should be used for such things as custody exchanges and online purchase exchanges. This is a safe, well lit area that is recorded and open 24 hours a day to help improve your safety during these transactions.

Additional safety precautions:

- We want to encourage you to meet at our police station.
- Our police station is open 24 hours a day, but we want to encourage you to not do transactions at night.
- Never meet in a secluded area.
- Never invite strangers to your home, or go to a stranger's house.
- Use your instincts. If a deal is too good to be true, it probably is.
- Always be cautious when purchasing/ selling a high priced item.

HELP US DURING SNOW & ICE Park cars in driveway or off the street

Whenever snow has fallen and the accumulation is such that it covers the streets and highways, and an emergency exists, no vehicle shall be parked on the streets or highways or portions thereof indicated. The above parking prohibitions shall remain in effect after the snow has ceased until the streets have been plowed sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic. Any unoccupied vehicle parked or standing in violation shall be deemed a nuisance and a menace to the safe and proper regulation of traffic and any police officer may provide for the removal of such vehicle. The owner shall pay the reasonable costs of the removal before regaining possession of the vehicle.

BRUSH PICKUP

Per Twp. ordinance, branches, hedge trimmings, brush clippings, etc. must be securely tied into **four foot bundles** that can be easily handled and the diameter of any branch may not exceed six inches. The bundles shall not exceed **forty pounds**. Public Works will pick up bundles on your designated day only if the ordinance is followed.

During storm damage, we will work with residents to pick up their brush, however the ordinance must be followed. No commercial vehicles can dump at Public Works. For questions please call Public Works at 856-228-3144.



SINGLE-STREAM RECYCLING GUIDELINES 2024

"RECYCLING COACH" APP IS AVAILABLE TO GLOUCESTER TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS



All residents are reminded that recycling is mandatory statewide. By removing recyclables from the regular trash flow, we help save our environment and save tax dollars that would otherwise be spent on trash disposal fees. The "Recycle Coach" App allows residents to enter their address and receive information about what is recyclable and pick-up dates. Download the free app at the Apple Store or Google Play.

HOW TO RECYCLE

Recycling carts are collected every other week at curb side. Use your cart space wisely. Compress and flatten recyclables to maximize cart space. Cardboard must be broken down and placed vertically in cart so that the cart will empty properly. The recycling carts' lid must be closed in order to be picked up. **NO PLASTICS BAGS**. All containers should be empty and rinsed and all recyclables must be kept as dry as possible. If you received a recycling cart, it must be used. Additional recycling material left outside recycling cart will be collected by a different truck. Any oversized cardboard that cannot be broken down (remove bubble wrap, plastic bags & Styrofoam) may be put out for overflow truck.

WHAT TO RECYCLE

Only recycling items listed below go into the recycling cart/container or the material will not be collected.

Glass: containers that were previously used for food or beverages. These containers may be clear, brown or green glass.

Metal: refers to aluminum, tin or bi-metal food and beverage containers.

Plastic: that only display the plastic class types #1 & #2 recycling triangle. These containers could have been used for beverages: juice, milk, soda and water; no loose lids.

Paper: newspaper & all inserts, catalogs, chipboard (beer & soda cartons), cereal boxes, computer paper, envelopes, gift boxes, greeting cards, junk mail, magazines, office paper, paper toilet/towel rolls, phone books, text books (without hard covers) and workbooks. **Cardboard:** must be flattened and folded in half then placed vertically in the cart, so it will not jam. Additional cardboard may be flattened and taped together in small batches and put off to the side, on the ground and away from the cart. Make sure all the inserts are out of the boxes. Oversize boxes leave empty off to the side and away from the cart as well. A different truck will collect the overflow cardboard.

WHAT NOT TO PUT IN THE RECYCLING CART/BUCKET

No grass, leaves, brush, batteries, electronics, construction debris, diapers, pizza boxes, Styrofoam, vinyl, food, pet waste, liquids or trash of any kind. NO PLASTICS BAGS: DO NOT put plastic bags in your recycling cart/bucket. DO NOT BAG RECY-CLABLES. Plastic bags are the worst contaminant in the recycling stream. Return plastic bags to retailers or dispose of with your household trash.

These items are to be thrown out with your household trash:

Glass: auto glass, ceramics, drinking glasses, window glass, mirrors and light bulbs.

Metal: aerosol cans, coat hangers, paint cans, pots, pans.

Plastic: anti-freeze or auto oil containers, bubble wrap, children's toys, flower pots, laundry baskets/buckets, lids, microwave food trays, plastic bags, plastic plates or utensils.

Paper: foil or wax coated cardboard (ice cream containers and frozen juice cartons, frozen dinner boxes), hard cover books, napkins, paper cups, pizza boxes, plates, shredded paper, tissues, towels and wrapping paper.

RECYCLING CONTAINERS

RECYCLING CONTAINERS: Multi-family properties - duplexes that need an additional 96-gallon recycling cart should call the GT Recycling Department @ 856-227-5665. Carts are only available through the Township. All carts are the property of Gloucester Township and must be left at your house if you move. Recycling carts used for any other purpose other than recycling will be confiscated. Please, do not put any markings on your cart as it is Township property; each cart has an identification number and a RFID tag which will correspond with your address.



SINGLE-STREAM RECYCLING GUIDELINES 2024

GRASS CLIPPINGS The Recycling Department collects grass clippings WEEKLY on the same day as your regular recycling day. Example: Your recycling day is every other Monday – your clippings will be picked up every Monday. Grass clippings can be placed into your yellow recycling bucket, a two handled container, a compostable brown lawn bag or a trash bag left untied at the curb. Maximum weight for each bag or container is 40 pounds. A maximum of 20 bags per week is allowed. Grass clippings generated by a commercial landscaper will not be collected.

LEAVES The Recycling Department collects WEEKLY on the same day as your regular recycling day. Put leaves in a two handled container, a compostable brown lawn bag or a trash bag left untied at the curb. Maximum weight for each bag or container is 40 pounds with a maximum of 20 bags per week. GTPW collects curbside leaves according to the fall leaf schedule. **Residents are reminded to rake their leaves to the curbside only during the fall and spring leaf schedule.**

STUMPS are collected every 3-4 weeks. Residents are to notify the Public Works Department at 228-3144 prior to pick-up.

BRUSH must be cut into 4ft lengths and tied into bundles not to exceed 40 pounds (as per Ordinance). Brush will be collected by Public Works every week on your regular recycling day with the exception of Friday which will be picked up on Thursday.

LAWN DEBRIS must be in a separate brown lawn bag or container from grass/leaves. This collection by Public Works is every week on your regular recycling day with the exception of Friday which will be picked up on Thursday. Make sure any bucket used, has two handles and is no larger than 32-gallons. Keep brush/debris separate from grass clippings and leaves. Grass clippings and leaves can be mixed as the Recycling Department recycles those into organic compost.

FIREWOOD residents are to notify Public Works at 856-228-3144 prior to pick-up.

ELECTRONICS: Waste Management Act makes it mandatory to recycle all electronics. Household electronics may be dropped off at the Public Works building. Public Works drop off hours are 8am-4pm, Monday - Thursday. Proof of residency required. Residents must call GTPW to schedule a pickup. **WHITE GOODS:** refrigerators, freezers, stoves, ovens, washers, dryers, water heaters and air conditioners are collected every Wednesday. Residents should call Public Works to schedule a pick-up. Remove the doors of refrigerators and freezers prior to leaving at curbside.

MOTOR OIL, CAR BATTERIES AND ANTI-FREEZE, may be brought to the Public Works Department.

CONCRETE, BRICK OR RUBBLE a limited amount may also be disposed of at Public Works, but there is no curbside pick-up of this material. Residents must show proof of Township residency.

SPECIAL WASTE includes automotive liquids, chemicals, fuels, household cleaners, paint related products (oil paints), pesticides and solvents. These hazardous materials cannot be disposed of with your regular trash. The Camden County Division of Environmental Affairs will take your hazardous materials. Please check their website camdencounty.com or call 856-858-5241 for drop-off dates. One will be held in Gloucester Twp at Camden County College.

Water based only latex paint (cleans up with soap & water) can be disposed of in your regular trash once it's dried out. To achieve the drying out technique; put a strong plastic bag in a cardboard box, then place kitty litter or sand into the plastic bag. Pour the water based paint into the plastic bag. If needed, add more kitty litter or sand. When the paint is dried out, tie the plastic bag and discard into the trash. When the inside of the empty paint can is hardened, you may dispose of it in the regular trash with the lid off.

Syringes & Needles DO NOT RECYCLE. Use a needle clipper (from pharmacy). After clipping off the needle put in an old coffee can or detergent bottle and seal original lid shut with duct tape. Write on container, "syringes-do not recycle" and throw in trash. Medication may be disposed of at the Police Station and Municipal Building. They have a mail box slot that is to be used to discard unwanted medications.

Trash Collection: Residents are urged to follow the same collection guidelines as before. If you have any questions call Interstate Waste Services at 973-623-7600. Tires, only two (2) tires per household with the metal rims removed, will be collected on your weekly trash day. Sinks and Toilets- tank separated from the bowl; will be picked up at curbside on your weekly trash day.

Your recyclables must be put out no earlier than 4pm the day prior to collection, but no later than 6am on the collection day. There will be no recycling collection on the following Holidays: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Recyclables will be collected on the following workday for those holidays only. All other recycling collection days in the holiday week stay the same (Do not wait an extra day). 
