She is an NCAA Individual High Jump Champion Outdoors 2000, a 6-time All American and holds Wheaton and Gettysburg College Indoor and Outdoor School Records.

Mrs. Simmons has shown great leadership with her peers and the students at Highland. She has demonstrated leadership in her professional and personal life. Her contributions to the community through her students show every time she enters the building every day. Mrs. Simmons is well respected by her colleagues and students at Highland High School.
