GLOUCESTER TOWNSHIP VETERANS AFFAIRS OFFICE WELCOMES VETERANS!



On July 30th, Gloucester Township Mayor David R. Mayer and Township Council held the Grand Opening and Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for the Gloucester Township Veterans Affairs Office. The office is run by two local veterans, Anthony Santanello and

Robert DiCesare, and provides services such as assistance in accessing health care, benefits administration, and support services. The office also aids with counseling and support for mental health and assists with employment and housing needs.

Anthony "Tony" Santanello, is a retired USAF veteran of 21 years. He is a member of Stetser Lamartine American Legion Post 281 for 22 years and has held numerous offices in the American Legion Department of New Jersey. Tony is passionate to help veterans in need especially to prevent veterans' suicide. "This is an opportunity of a lifetime for me to continue my service in helping not only American Legion veterans but all veterans in Gloucester Township. This is the Mayor's vision; the vision that gives Bob and I a chance to help veterans in unique ways and inform them of the benefits available to them."

Robert DiCesare started his military career in the Erial section of Gloucester Township at the Nike Hercules Missile Base. Robert was sent to South Korea where he spent 17 months. His civilian path, especially his work in home mortgages, provides him with the skill set to aid veterans with housing concerns. "Working for the Veterans Affairs Office is a treat of a lifetime! I get to speak with and hopefully help veterans like me, who have dedicated their lives to protecting and making sure the USA is a land where all people are created equal and free to live their lives and grow up as they wish! I love helping people and this means a lot to me. I will continue to do my best to help each veteran that comes into the office; and I enjoy working with Tony who has dedicated his life to helping all veterans!" said Robert DiCesare.

The new tank is a split unit holding 10,000 gallons of gas and 10,000 gallons of diesel with 2 more filling stations added for a total of 4.

The Gloucester Township Public Works fuel tank serves multiple departments including the Gloucester Township Department of Public Works and Police Department, Gloucester Township Fire Companies, Pine Hill Public Works and Fire Companies, and Clementon Public Works and Fire Companies. MAYOR MAYER, CHIEF HARKINS, AND DISTRICT 4 LEGISLATORS ADDRESS EVENTS AT GT DAY

In June, Mayor David Mayer and Police Chief David Harkins joined Senator Paul Moriarty, Assemblyman Dan Hutchinson and Assemblyman Cody Miller at Veterans Park in Gloucester Township to announce new legislation seeking to deter the dangerous behavior that occurred Gloucester Township Day. The legislation comes in response to an incident at GT Day, during which multiple fights broke out after hundreds of teens and young adults descended on day's festivities in coordination fashion resulting in several people requiring medical treatment for minor injuries at the scene, including law enforcement officers. The proposed amendments to the local curfew by Mayor Mayer and Chief Harkins were approved and adopted by the Township Council.

The proposed legislation prepared by Senator Moriarty, and Assemblymen Hutchinson and Miller includes:

- the establishment of penalties for certain conduct related to public brawl and disorderly acts;
- amending state criminal laws regarding the incitement of a public brawl and upgrading penalties;
- requiring the Attorney General to establish training programs for crowd management and provide resources to local law enforcement concerning large gatherings, flash mobs, and pop-up parties;
- liability for parents and guardians of offending juvenile suspects involved in such crimes

The adopted Township Ordinance amending the township's curfew regulations complements the efforts being undertaken at the State level by:

- expanding the list of public areas covered by the curfew restriction to include parks, playgrounds, and similar public places;
- increasing penalties for disorderly conduct through fines and community service and clarifying that juvenile offenders and par- ents who knowingly allow such conduct can both be subject to liability.

"I would like to commend Senator Moriarty, Assemblyman Hutchison and Assemblyman Miller for their efforts to address instances of disorderly conduct and public brawls. The incidents during a family-oriented event such as Gloucester Township Day where multiple fights broke out among hundreds of teens and young adults have no place in our community. It is important that these juveniles know of the repercussions of their actions. Also, it is important for the parents to know the repercussions for not knowing where their child is. Today is a great example of State, County, and local government collaborating to ensure the safety of our residents and we are grateful for this strong relationship with our fellow policy makers," said Mayor David R. Mayer.

"The lawlessness that we experienced at the 2024 Gloucester Township Day event was caused predominantly by juveniles who were dropped off and unsupervised. We looked at how to help prevent it from ever happening again, while addressing parental accountability for the actions of their children. These legislative measures will provide the means to improve public safety by focusing on violent behavior and by holding parents accountable for the actions of their children," said Chief David Harkins.

Work Continues on the Gloucester Township Community Arts Center

If you haven't noticed yet, work is ongoing at the old bank building located at 3 Black Horse Pike in the Blackwood section of Gloucester Township. Construction work is in progress to convert the Old Bank building to a multi-use community center/black box theater in the heart of the Arts District.

The old glass and aluminum storefront entry has been removed and new concrete stairs have been poured. Currently there is a temporary structure holding up the limestone lintel above the front entry, but a new beam and columns will be installed in the next few weeks. The plan is to restore the front entry of the building

to resemble the look of the original historic bank building.

The slate roof has been repaired and new EPDM roofing has been installed on the flat roof portions of the building to make the roof watertight. On the exterior, the old aluminum frame windows have been replaced with new aluminum clad Pella windows.

On the interior, work is also progressing. Mechanical, plumbing and electrical rough-ins are almost completed in the bathroom areas.

In the next couple of weeks, installation of drywall and finishes in the bathrooms will begin. Bathroom finishes include ceramic tile on the floors and walls with suspended ceilings. Once the finishes are completed, a new handicapped lift will also be installed.

While construction of this project is broken up into two phases, phase one, which includes exterior work and limited interior construction, is on schedule at this time. Workers are very excited to uncover the front pediment to see if the old clock can be restored, reminiscent of "Back to the Future's" famous scene of "Save the clock tower!"



It is with much anticipation that we wait to see what still remains and what can be recovered under the existing vertical siding. We appreciate your patience while work continues. We look forward to cutting the ribbon on this new community facility in the not-so-distant future and thank 4th Legislative District and Senator Paul Moriarty for allocating an additional \$500,000 for this project!

BRUSH PICKUP

As per Township Ordinance, branches, hedge trimmings, light brush clippings, etc. must be securely tied into **four foot (4') bundles** that can be easily handled and the diameter of any branch may not exceed six inches (6"). The bundles shall not exceed **fifty (50) pounds** in weight. Public Works will pick up bundles on your designated day only if the ordinance is followed.

During storm damage, we will work with residents to pick up their brush, however the ordinance must be followed. No commercial vehicles can dump at Public Works. For questions on brush pick-up please call Public Works at 856-228-3144.

Please separate your grass from yard debris, sticks, trash, etc or it will not be picked up by the GT Recycling Center To contact them please call 856-227-5665.

White Goods Pick-Up

Public Works now picks up white goods: refrigerators, air conditioners, ranges, washers, dryers and hot water heaters. Please call PW at 856-228-3144 for items to be picked up on Wednesdays.

Saturday Drop-Off Hours at Public Works

The Public Works facility will be open on Saturdays, September 7th through November 23rd, from 8am-2pm for residential recycling drop off. This will be for brush, oil, white goods, electronics, metals, concrete, and car batteries. We do not accept paint or trash.

Bagged Grass Clippings and Bagged Leaves

GTPW collects leaves according to the fall leaf schedule. A second pick up will start after the first round is complete, weather permitting. Residents are reminded to rake their leaves curbside, NOT IN THE STREET, only during the fall leaf schedule which ends 12/31. After this time all leaves must be bagged.

CAMDEN COUNTY SPECIAL NEEDS REGISTRY




The Gloucester Township Police Department and the Camden County Prosecutors Office have a registry for individuals with Special Needs and disabilities in an effort to give police quick access in an emergency to critical information about a person who is registered. The registry can provide police with emergency contact information, detailed physical descriptions, known routines, favorite attractions, or the needs of an individual with Special Needs and other disabilities such as Alzheimer's, Dementia, Down Syndrome, or any other endangered individuals.

This information can greatly assist police officers when time is essential in communicating and dealing with an emergency situation involving a person with Special Needs and disabilities. The online registration asks for valuable information that the police officer may need when helping individuals with Special Needs and disabilities. We ask that all questions be filled out completely and a current photograph be provided, which can be submitted online to Camden County Prosecutors Office Special Needs Registry here: https://camdencountypros.org/communitypage/41

The information you provide is confidential and will only be used by our police officers. If any of the information on the registration changes you are encouraged to re-register as soon as possible.

Another step we have taken to better assist our Gloucester Township community members with Autism and Special Needs is by creating a sticker that can be placed on your vehicle or near the main entrance to your home that will alert an approaching officer that someone in the vehicle or the home could have a special need. We also have seatbelt sleeves that will warn a First Responder during an incident such as a motor vehicle crash that the occupant has Autism and may not respond. GTPD Citizens Police Academy 2025 Registration Begins Nov. 1st, 2024

Would you like to learn more about the Gloucester Township Police Department? The Gloucester Township Police Department, in a continuing effort to foster an even better police-community partnership, would like to invite any Gloucester Township resident 16 years of age or older to attend the Citizens Police Academy.

The Gloucester Township Police Department Citizens Police Academy is a free 10-week course that begins January 20, 2025. The classes will be on Thursdays from 6:30 - 8:30PM. The course will include an overview of the police department and the administration, police communications, special operations, criminal investigations, traffic safety, K9, Special Response Team, Crime Scene Unit, and much more. Also, all attendees of the Citizen Police Academy will be trained in the use of CPR at home.

The objective of the Citizen Police Academy is not to train an individual to be a Police Officer but to produce informed citizens. The Citizens and Police Officers meet each other face to face in a neutral, friendly setting and each becomes a person to the other. In the past, citizens have simply seen a uniform. Now, they have an understanding of the person behind the badge. Through your participation, you are promoting community involvement, which in itself is the most powerful force any law enforcement agency has in the fight against crime. This is also the first step as a community partner and for those who may be interested in becoming a Gloucester Township Police Volunteer.

Join or Start a Neighborhood Watch

WHAT IS IT?



A Neighborhood Watch is neighbors helping neighbors. They are extra eyes and ears for reporting crime and helping neighbors. Members meet their neighbors, learn how to make their homes more secure, watch out for each other and the neighborhood, and report activity that raises their suspicions to the police or sheriff's office. Neighborhood Watch, Block Watch, Town Watch, Building Watch, Crime

Watch – whatever the name, it's one of the most effective and least costly ways to prevent crime and reduce fear. Neighborhood Watch fights the isolation that crime both creates and feeds upon. It forges bonds among area residents, helps reduces burglaries and robberies, and improves relations between police and the communities they serve.

WHY NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH?

- It works. Throughout the country, dramatic decreases in burglary and related offenses are reported by law enforcement professionals in communities with active Watch programs.
- Today's transient society produces communities that are less personal. Many families have two working parents and children involved in many activities keeping them away from home. An empty house in a neighborhood where none of the neighbors know the owner is a prime target for burglary. Neighborhood Watch also helps build pride and serves as a springboard for efforts that address other community concerns such as recreation for youth, child care, and affordable housing.

HOW DOES A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH START?

A motivated individual, a few concerned residents, a community organization, or a law enforcement agency can spearhead the efforts to establish a Watch. Together they can:

- Organize a small planning committee of neighbors to discuss needs, the level of interest, and possible community problems.
- Contact the GTPD Community Relations Bureau for information on setting up an initial meeting.
- Start asking around, by word of mouth, phone or Social Media, to gauge neighbors' interest; establish the purpose of the program; and begin to identify issues that need to be addressed.
- Select a coordinator.
- Recruit members, keeping up-to-date information on new residents and making special efforts to involve the elderly, working parents, and young people.
- Work with local government or law enforcement to put up Neighborhood Watch signs, usually after at least 50 percent of all households are enrolled.

School Is In Session-Watch For Stopped School Buses



Nationally, over the past 32 years, 414 students have been killed while in the process of being picked up or dropped off by a school bus. This translates into almost 13 deaths each year over the last three decades.

Those motorists either did not know what flashing red lights meant or disregarded them. These drivers caused hundreds of deaths that could have been prevented. To prevent more deaths like these, learn the law and obey it. This year, Gloucester Township Police Chief David Harkins and Mayor David Mayer assisted with creating a video which illustrates the rules of the road concerning school buses, which can be viewed here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Rzoum1PStHc

Marked and Unmarked Police vehicles will be following behind school buses conducting targeted proactive enforcement for passing violations. We are also conducting annual training with bus drivers to help everyone work together to help with the safety of our students during transportation.

The Law – Passing Stopped School Buses (39:4-128.1)

1) On a two-lane highway, or other road not divided by some type of physical barrier, stop at least 25 feet from a stopped school bus with flashing red lights whether or not you are traveling in the same direction as the bus.

2) Stop at least 25 feet from a stopped school bus with flashing red lights if you are on a divided highway and on the same side of the highway as the school bus.

Remain stopped until all students are safely on the bus or on the side of the highway, and until the bus's flashing red lights have been turned off.

3) Vehicles approaching a stopped school bus – but from the opposite side of a divided highway – that is picking up or letting off students may pass at 10 mph or less and must remain at that speed until completely past the stopped school bus.

4) Travel no faster than 10 mph by a stopped school bus that is picking up or letting off students directly at a school (or day camp or any school-related activity) located on the same side of the highway where the school bus is stopped.

School bus drivers are required to use flashing red lights when their bus is stopped to pick up or drop off students, and until every student is safely on the bus or clear of the bus and highway.

Fines & Points:

A violation of these laws results in a \$100 fine, and up to 15 days in jail or up to 15 days community service for a first offense. For subsequent offenses, violators can receive a \$250 fine or more and up to 15 days in jail. Five points are added to a driver's record for each offense.
