New Seward Johnson Sculptures Spark Connection and Creativity in the Arts District





Seward Johnson, celebrated for his work at Grounds for Sculpture—a 42-acre sculpture park in Hamilton Township, NJ—is internationally known for crafting hyper-realistic sculptures that capture ordinary moments with extraordinary emotion. His art invites viewers to pause, interact, and find beauty in the everyday. Featured in cities across the world, Johnson's installations transform public spaces into powerful artistic experiences.

"Public art like this strengthens our sense of place and adds meaning to our community spaces," said Mayor Mayer. "We're thrilled to once again feature Seward Johnson's work here in Downtown Blackwood and look forward to the connections these new pieces will inspire."

Now on display until fall of 2025, "Chance Meeting" featuring two women deep in conversation on a bench outside Ren's Coffeehouse and Books—is a tribute to the kind of everyday connection that happens naturally in vibrant, walkable community spaces. "Weekend Painter" placed in Harwan Park—is a fitting preview of what's ahead: a mural-in-progress on Mystic Ginger's building that will soon add even more color and creativity to the district.



CT Honors Fallen Officer Christopher M. L. Reese with Town Hero Banner







Gloucester Township gathered in solemn unity to honor the memory of Police Officer Christopher M. L. Reese, whose life was tragically taken in the line of duty earlier this year. In a heartfelt ceremony, the Township unveiled a Town Hero Banner in his memory—a tribute to his bravery, dedication, and ultimate sacrifice.

Mayor David R. Mayer and Police Chief David Harkins were both in attendance and offered moving remarks that captured the spirit of the day and the profound sense of loss felt by the entire community. Officer Reese's family and friends they spoke about his courage, commitment to service, and the lasting impact he made on all who knew him.

Officer Christopher Reese and his partner, Officer Cameron Girvin, were fatally shot during a routine traffic stop on February 21, 2025, in Virginia Beach. After approaching a vehicle with expired tags, the officers were met with violent resistance. Despite their professionalism and courage, the suspect opened fire, shooting both officers twice before fleeing. Officer Reese succumbed to his injuries shortly after midnight at Princess Anne Hospital. He was 30 years old.

Officer Reese had served with the Virginia Beach Police Department for three years, following three years of service with the Virginia Beach Sheriff's Office. He is remembered as a dedicated public servant, a loyal friend, and a beloved son and brother.

Gloucester Township extends its deepest condolences to the Reese and Girvin families and reaffirms its commitment to honoring those who risk everything to keep our communities safe.
